

ACE Quick Guide to Cornell Notetaking

What is Cornell Notetaking?

Cornell notetaking is a method of taking notes that enables you to **organise**, **condense**, and **review your notes effectively.** This can result in **better comprehension** and **retention** of new learning.

You can use Cornell notetaking for:



Lectures

Reading and research



To use this method, you should divide your page into **three** different sections:

Notes column

Cue column

Summary column

Top Tips for Cornell Notetaking:



Use **headings**, **sub-headings**, and **bullet points** to organise your main notes column.



Leave clear spaces between each main idea and point.



Use your own words!



Include visual prompts where possible, e.g. images, diagrams, mind-maps.



Allocate additional study time to review notes and develop the cue column.



Use the cue column to extract key words and main ideas, connect new learning to previous learning, reflect on links to professional practice, and identify gaps in knowledge and areas for further research.
