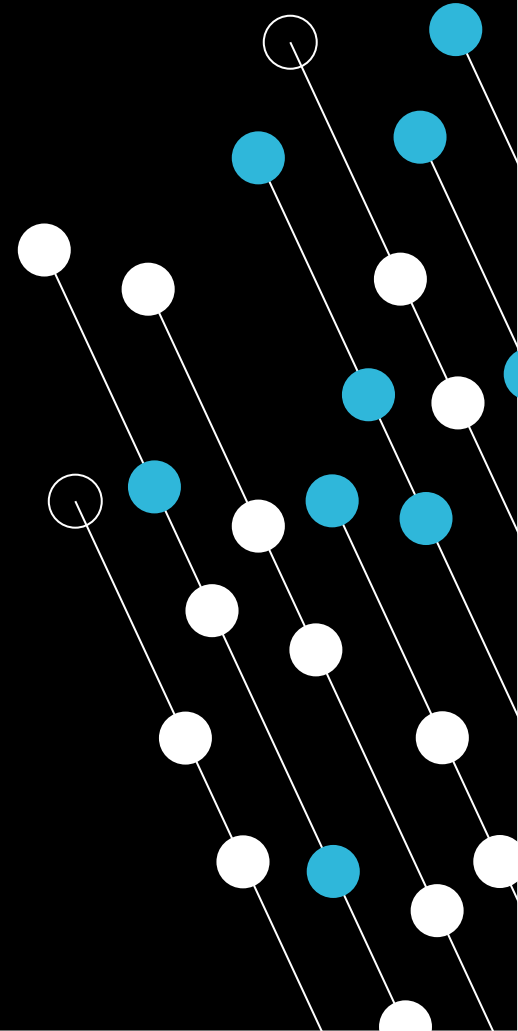



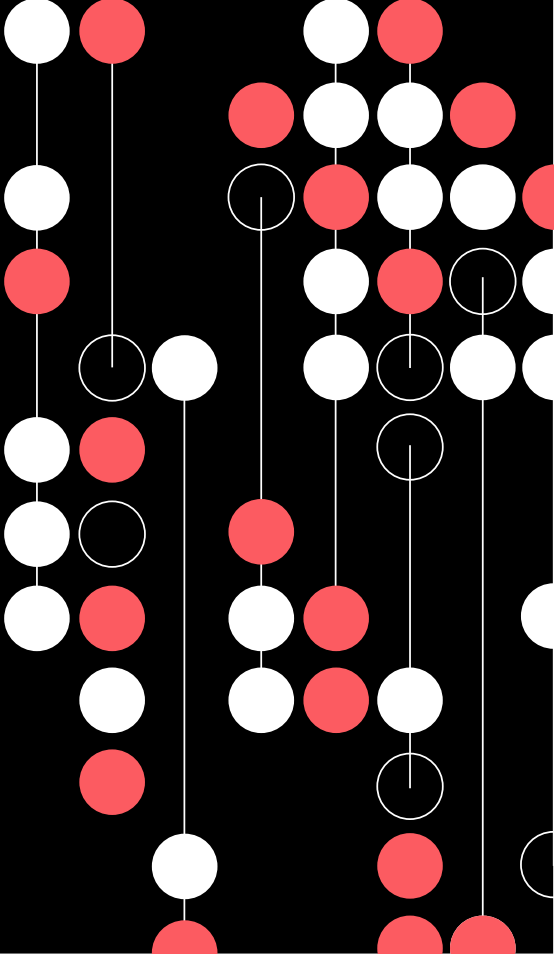

# Identifying Appropriate Resources

## The CRAAP Test:

**The CRAAP Test** is a helpful 'checklist' for assessing the reliability and credibility of a resource. This checklist is usually presented as a list of questions and examines:

**Currency** – the timeliness of the information.

**Relevance** – the importance of the information to your needs.

**Authority** – the source of the information.

**Accuracy** – the reliability, truthfulness, and correctness of the content.

**Purpose** – the reason the information exists.



# CRAAP Test: Useful Questions

TIP!

When gathering sources for an assignment, it is good practice to **interrogate the literature** by asking these questions.

**Currency:** The timeliness of the information

- When was the information published or posted?
- Has the information been revised or updated?
- Is the information current or out of date for your topic?

**Relevance:** The importance of the information for your needs

- Does the information relate to your topic or answer your question?
- Have you looked at a variety of sources before choosing this one?

**Authority:** The source of the information

- Who is the author/ publisher/ source/ sponsor?
- What are the author's credentials or organizational affiliations given?

**Accuracy:** The reliability, truthfulness, and correctness of the content

- Is the information supported by evidence?
- Has the information been reviewed or refereed?

**Purpose:** The reason the information exists

- What is the purpose of the information?
- Does the point of view appear objective and impartial?

- ✓ Shares the **author's affiliations** with universities, labs and companies.
- ✓ **Shows when and where** the source was published and **how recently** it has been cited.

# In-Text Citations



# In-Text Citations



An in-text citation is a **short acknowledgement included whenever you quote or take information from a source** in academic writing. It gives enough information to uniquely identify the source in your reference list.

**TIP!**

Regardless of the source type, the format of your in-text citation will generally be:

QA Harvard: **(Surname, Year)** or **(Organisation, Year)**  
Solent Harvard: **(Surname Year)** or **(Organisation Year)**

## In-Text Citations: Tips



If there is no named author, use the **name of the organisation**.



If you cannot find a date of publication date, try to **find the same information elsewhere**.

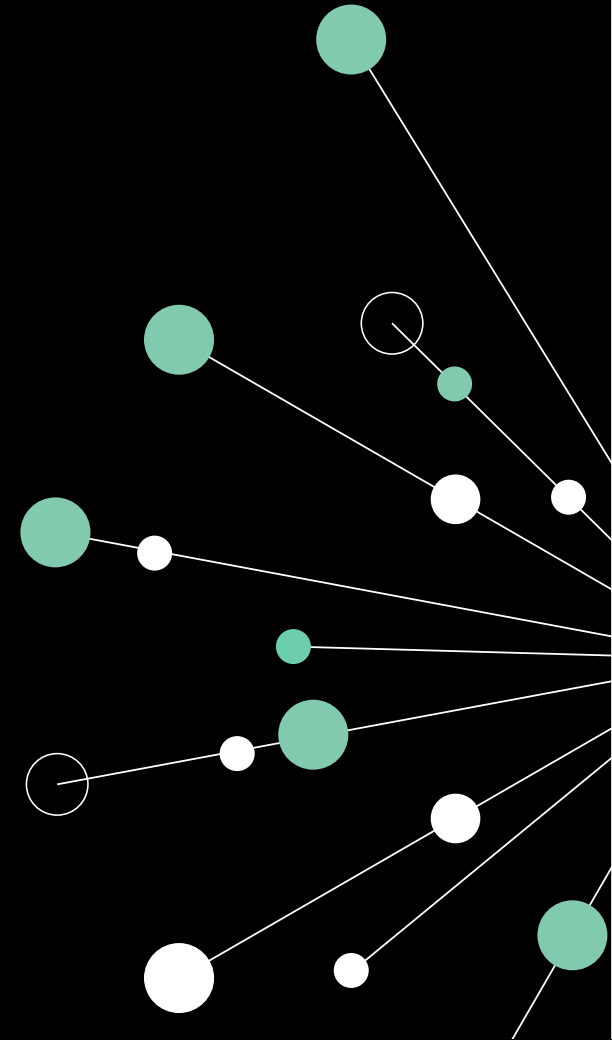


If there are **four or more authors** you must include the first named author, followed by 'et al.'



Look at pages 5-10 of the QA Apprenticeships Harvard Referencing Guide, **or** pages 1 and 4 of the Solent Harvard Referencing Guide for guidance on formatting **multiple citations, sources with the same author and year** and **secondary citations**.

# Reference List





## Reference List



Your reference list appears at the end of your assignment. **Each reference list entry corresponds with an in-text citation in your main body**, providing further details of publication so your reader can identify and verify the source.

**TIP!**

Different sources, e.g. books, journal articles and conference papers, are formatted differently.

Always use your QA Apprenticeships Harvard Referencing Guide or Solent Harvard Referencing Guide to complete your references.

## Referencing: Tips



Only include the **first initial** of the author's name.



Always use the official **referencing guide** to format your entries correctly for different source types.



**Store your sources** so you can refer back to them if necessary, e.g. OneNote, Excel Spreadsheet, Word Document, Favourites, Collections.

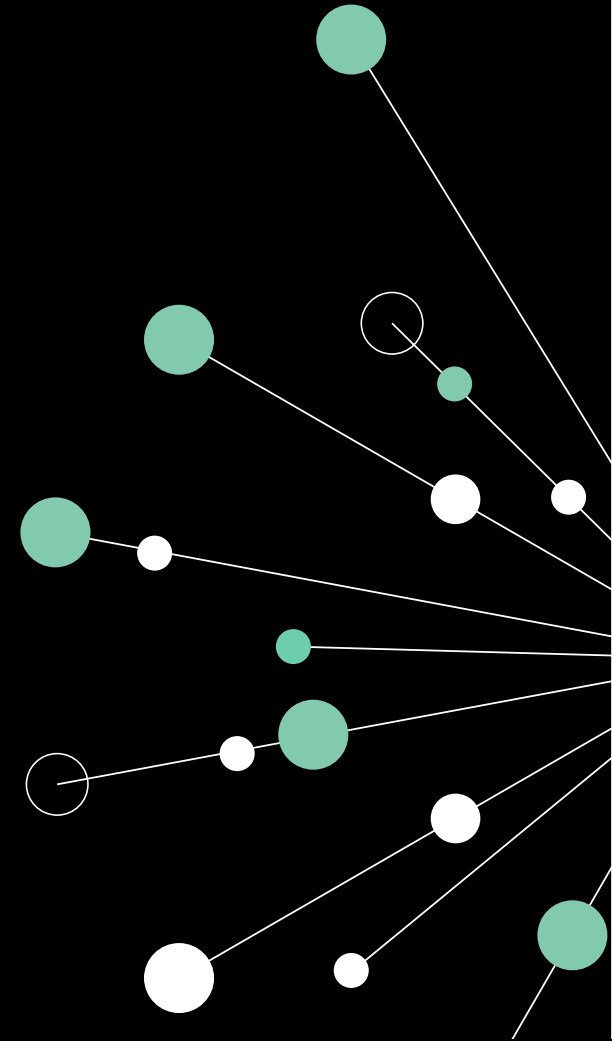


**Reference as you go!** Avoid leaving your referencing until the last minute.



**Do not use automatic reference generators!**

## Searching for Sources Online - Review



Google Scholar enables you to assess the authority of the author by sharing author affiliations and number of citations
